KANGRA



Kangra is a historic town in Himachal Pradesh, nestled in the scenic foothills of the Dhauladhar Range. Known for the massive, ancient Kangra Fort and the sacred Brajeshwari Devi Temple. It is a hub of culture and natural beauty historically referred to as Nagarkot or Bhim Kot. It serves as a popular tourist destination combining spirituality, history and Himalayan landscapes.

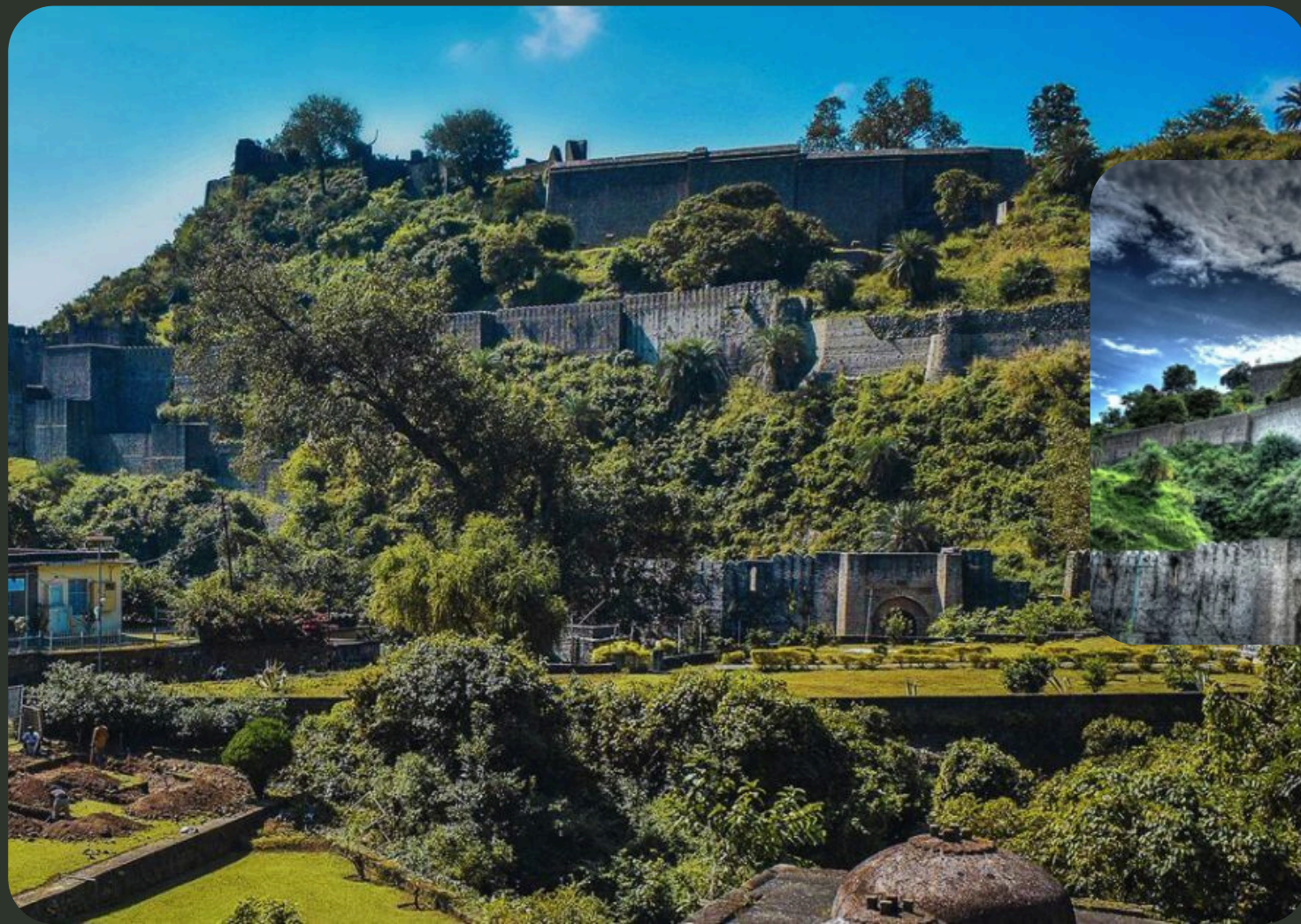

KANGRA FORT

The Kangra Fort in Himachal Pradesh is one of India's oldest and largest, built by the Katoch Dynasty atop a steep cliff overlooking the Banganga and Majhi rivers. Known for its immense wealth and strategic value, it survived invasions by Mahmud of Ghazni (1009 AD) before being heavily damaged in a 1905 earthquake.



MASROOR ROCK CUT TEMPLE

The Masroor Rock Cut Temple is an 8th-century monolithic Hindu temple complex in Himachal Pradesh's Kangra Valley, renowned for its North Indian Nagara style architecture. Carved from a single sandstone rock, this "Himalayan Ellora" features 15 shrines dedicated to Shiva, Vishnu and Shakti faces northeast towards the Dhauladhar range.

KARERI LAKE



Kareri Lake is a high-altitude, shallow freshwater lake situated at 2,934 meters (9,626 ft) in the Dhauladhar Range of Kangra District, Himachal Pradesh. Known for its crystal clear water fed by melting snow, it is a popular trekking destination near Dharamshala, often frozen from December to March April.



BAJRESHWARI DEVI TEMPLE

The Bajreshwari Devi Temple in Kangra, Himachal Pradesh, is an ancient revered Shakti Peeth where Goddess Sati's left breast is believed to have fallen. Known for its intricate stone carvings the temple is dedicated to Goddess Vajreshwari, an incarnation of Parvati. Rebuilt after a 1905 earthquake, it is a significant pilgrimage site featuring three Pindi forms of goddesses.

CHAMUNDA DEVI TEMPLE



The Chamunda Devi Temple (or Chamunda Nandikeshwar Dham) is a 700 year old Hindu temple dedicated to Goddess Chamunda, a fierce form of Durga located on the banks of the Baner River in Himachal Pradesh's Kangra district. Situated near Palampur and Dharamshala, it is regarded as a major Shakti Peeth surrounded by scenic Dhauladhar mountains.

PRAGPUR HERITAGE VILLAGE

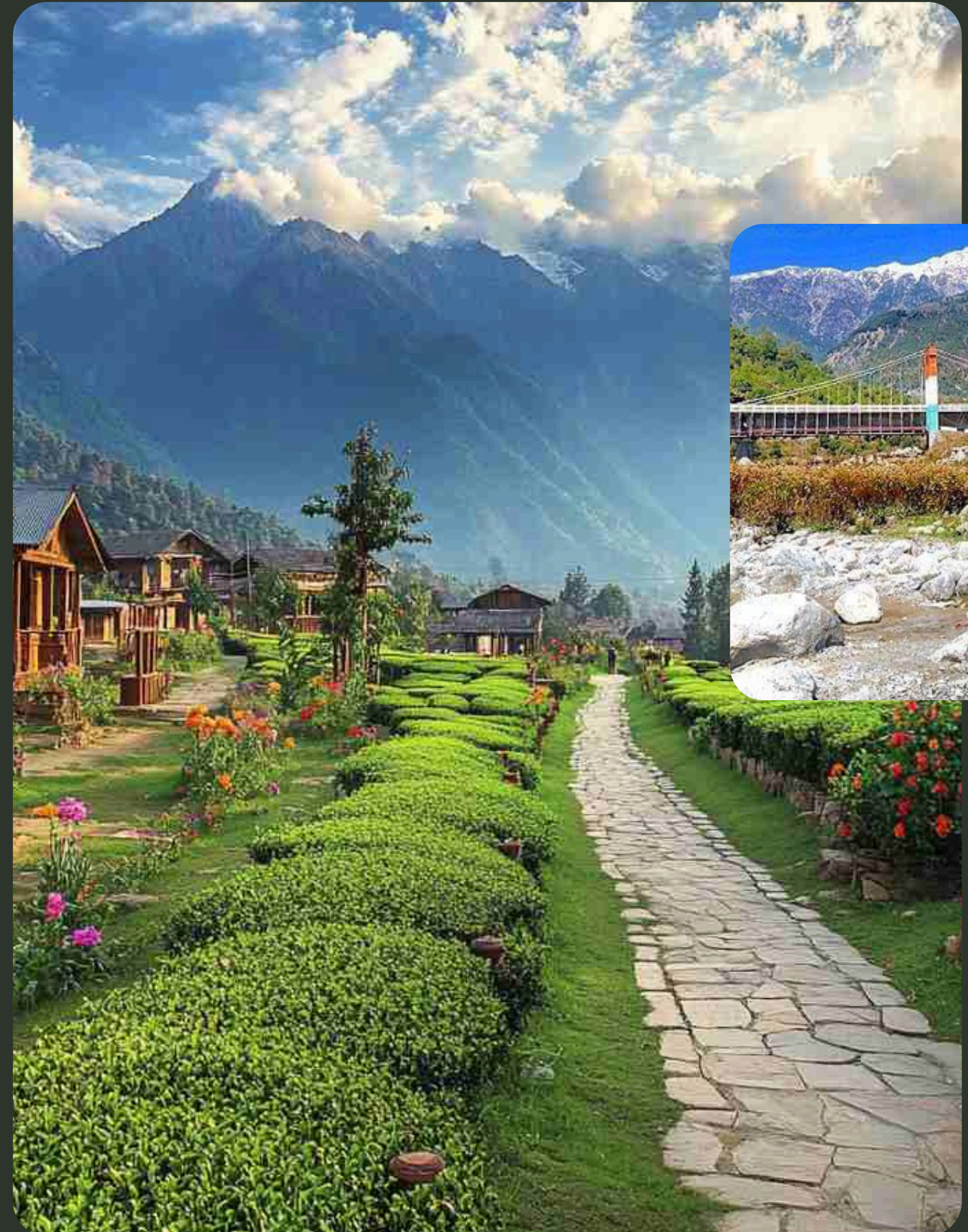
Pragpur, located in Kangra Valley, Himachal Pradesh, is India's first officially designated Heritage Village (declared in 1997). Founded in the late 16th century, it is renowned for its well preserved, Vaastu compliant architecture, cobbled streets and mud plastered slate roofed houses. It is a tranquil scenic destination focused on preserving traditional rural Indian culture and history.



PALAMPUR

Palampur is a scenic hill station in Himachal Pradesh's Kangra Valley, famously known as the tea capital of North India. Situated at ~1,220 meters at the foot of the snow capped Dhauladhar ranges, it is characterized by extensive tea gardens, pine forests, and numerous sparkling streams. It is an ideal, serene destination for nature, trekking and tea tourism.

Top activities include visiting the expansive Wah Tea Estate, taking a toy train ride on the scenic Kangra Valley railway, paragliding at nearby Bir Billing and exploring the serene Baijnath Temple.





BIR BILLING

Bir Billing, located in Himachal Pradesh's Kangra district, is renowned as the "Paragliding Capital of India," featuring the world's highest takeoff point (2,430 meters) in Billing and a landing site in Bir village. It is a premier destination for adventure sports, including paragliding, trekking and mountain biking, alongside Tibetan culture, monasteries and a tranquil atmosphere in the Dhauladhar Range.
